	Since Jesus mandates that all disciples be baptized, it's for discipleship. It's not required for salvation, but it's mandatory for discipleship.	
	John is not the kind of person that demands to an order before carrying it out. So when Jesus says do it, he does it.	
2.	We live lives, and baptism tells and even re-enacts God's redemption story. It's an important aspect of spiritual formation.

Baptism tells a story that is part of a much story.
• F When Jesus is baptized as a sign of repentance, he is identifying with us and our sin just as he will identify with us and our sin on the cross. His baptism foreshadows his atoning sacrifice as our representative on the cross.
Jesus dies as a criminal even though he never committed a crime. He's baptized as a sign of even though he has nothing from which to repent.
Design
One design pattern in the Bible story is the pattern of going through to enter new life (see Romans 6:1-5; 1 Peter 3:19-22)
There is also a pattern of divine love within God in the Bible.

The studied reader knows about the connection between the Servant of Isaiah 42 (alluded to his God's words to Jesus) and the Servant of Isaiah 53.
When you were baptized, you were parts of God's story, entering that story, being formed by that story. But you weren't doing it for yourself alone. You were doing it for everyone who was there that day. Everyone was entering the story and being formed by the story.
