
### ESUS' BETRAYAL

f you are familiar with the Easter story, you are probably familiar with he betrayal of Jesus by Judas, his friend. But there is more betrayal and oneliness in this story. Jesus took his disciples to pray with him as he vrestled with the knowledge of what was to happen to him that night. He leeded the support of his friends. And how did they "support" him? By leeping! Then there is the story of Peter, one of the most instrumental lisciples, who denied knowing Jesus three different times. Next is the tory of the Jews, Jesus' own people as a whole. The Jews wanted a Aessiah to deliver them from the Romans, but in this story they proclaim heir allegiance to these very Romans when it became convenient for hem. Their laws wouldn't allow them to put anyone to death, and for esus, they weren't satisfied with their customary punishments. So they urned him over to the Romans, asking for crucifixion. And finally, there s the story of the crucifixion itself, which we will address tomorrow.

#### ESUS' SUBMISSION

n Matthew, before Jesus' arrest, we saw Jesus overwhelmed with orrow, praying for God's will to be done, even though it would cost him nuch. He prays some powerful words, asking God to spare him if lossible, but then he submits himself to the Father, saying, Nevertheless, not as I will, but as you will." God's will was more mportant to him than his own comfort or status. After his arrest, Jesus vas repeatedly taunted by his accusers. They mocked him and his laimed connection with God, who was not coming to his rescue. Here esus is betrayed by his most beloved of creation: man, whom he created n his own image. Perhaps the closest analogy we have to this is our own hildren—our children, whom we can remember before they were born, vhom we held, comforted, guided, and love unconditionally. These are he faces Jesus stared into that night, and he willing subjected himself to hem.



Read | Matthew 27:27–44; Philippians 2:6–7

Reflect | Spend some time reflecting on the following questions.

esus experienced loneliness and betrayal during the crucifixion but kept is eyes on God for strength. Think of a time that you have experienced oneliness or betrayal, a time when you needed a friend but felt abanloned. How could the story have changed if you had followed Jesus' example of reliance on God for your support?

All of us are guilty of sin and betrayal of our Creator. How can you relate o the sleepy disciples, Judas, or the Jews, betraying the God who loves 'ou and created you?

f you have never given up your life for the sake of Christ, consider eaching out to God now and submitting yourself to his always-loving imbrace.



Consider a time in your life that you were resistant to God's authority. Iow did it turn out? How may it have turned out differently if you had ollowed Jesus' example of submitting to God?

Compare these passages with John 19:11. Jesus had the power to change its circumstances, yet he did not because God's will was of utmost importance to him. What is of utmost importance to you?

esus willingly gave himself up to be humiliated and tortured for our ternal salvation, which he considered greater than his own comfort. Consider how you can give up your own status for something greater.



Pray | Pray for courage to make the next difficult, godly choice.

#### ESUS' CHOICE

As we reflect on the last three days of study, recall the various emotions esus has experienced. We've seen him overwhelmed by the task of aking on the sins of the world, overwhelmed with sorrow "to the point of death." He felt loneliness again and again as his disciples failed to upport him in his time of deepest need. He was disowned by one of his closest friends and betrayed to death by another friend. He was mocked, numiliated, and tortured to death by his most beloved of creation.

And through all of this, taking on the sins of the world, Jesus willingly ubjected himself to the wrath of a just God. As we saw in Day 1, the 3ible says that Jesus was completely dependent on the Father. He was lever apart from God. But taking on our sins, the unthinkable took place: esus experienced total separation from God. Yet he continued the task at land to the cross and beyond.



Read | Matthew 27:46; John 5:30, 8:27–28; John 13:14–15





Consider a time that you have given yourself permission to take an "easy nut" in the face of pain or adversity, and consider how it turned out. How fould it have changed if you had followed Jesus' example of choosing Bod's will?

ust before his death, Jesus experienced separation from God. He felt bandoned and forsaken by God. When have you been able to relate to his feeling of being far from God?

esus never took his eyes off the Father and his will during this time. But reviously, Jesus had said that he did nothing on his own. He consulted 3od the Father for every move he made, and he was completely reliant in the Father. How can you follow Jesus' example and grow in your eliance on God the Father as well?

*Pray* | *Celebrate the relevance of Jesus' triumph in your life!* 

ESUS' TRIUMPH . . . over feeling overwhelmed, over sorrow, over oneliness, over betrayal, over mockery, over physical torture, over eparation from God. Jesus completes his task!

And then he is resurrected from the dead, not only living again but joinng God and sitting at the right hand of his Father in perfect unity again! God has exalted him above all else. God has given him the name above all names, the most powerful name in all creation.

Colossians says that Jesus disarmed the rulers and authorities and put hem to open shame when he triumphed over them at the cross. The ulers and authorities of this world that would attempt to separate you rom God have been defeated. You now have access to the name above III names and complete freedom to live a full, peaceful, abundant life!



Read | Matthew 28:5-6; Philippians 2:9-11; Colossians 2:15



Consider the women in Matthew 28:5–6. They were afraid because they lid not know what had happened to Jesus' body. But look at the angel's vords: "just as he said." Jesus did exactly what he said he would do. Jeus is still doing exactly what he said he would do. How can you triumph wer the fear in your life, trusting God to do what he says he will do?

Take some intentional time to reflect on Jesus' choices and pain that we have studied this week. Reflect on his triumph over each and every one, rulminating in his unparalleled triumph on the cross. Think about everyhing he endured for you! How does this triumph affect your life?
