SERIES: The Promised Land (Joshua & Judges) **SERMON 1:** "Be Strong and Courageous"

TEXT: Joshua 1:1-11 **DATE:** October 3/4, 2015

Exodus 17:8-13; 24:12-18; Numbers 13:1-14:12; 27:12-23

Be Strong and Courageous

Joshua's fears are our fears.

- "Will I measure up. The expectations are so high."
- "Can I meet this challenge that seems impossible right now: to raise my kids, to find a job,
 to fight temptation, to get that degree, to face physical pain, to keep going even though
 I'm depressed, to help my ailing parents, to face a bully."
- And then there's that fear that can keep even the most courageous awake at night: the
 fear that sets in when they realize a situation they really care about is beyond their control.

What God says to Joshua, to help him overcome his fear, he says to us as well. Joshua has nothing on us expect a bigger challenge.

- You can count on God's promises. God makes some big promises to Joshua. His
 promises to you and me, to anyone who is his child through faith in Christ, are eternal. If
 God's priorities (his kingdom) are your priorities, you really can't lose.
- You can count on the promises of God, but you can't presume on the promises of God. Joshua had to grab hold of what God promised. There is what theologians call "the indicative and imperative" of the Christian life. It's a common pattern you see in the New Testament. You are a child of God (indicative), therefore live like a child of God (imperative). You are made righteous in Christ (indicative), therefore live righteously (imperative). You are saved by faith alone (indicative), therefore work out your salvation (imperative).
- God promises his presence to his people: "I will be with you." He promised it to Moses (Exodus 3:12), to Joshua (Joshua 1:5), and to you (Hebrews 13:5-6; Matthew 28:20).
- If God speaks and guides through his Word, we need to be serious students of his Word. Scripture reveals God's character and his plans so we can know what is truly important. It tells us who we are and what we need to do. It explains life. God tells us to meditate on it. To speak it. To be a student of his Word so we can know God and his promises, and so what we can experience his presence as we face the challenges of our lives.

We have something Joshua lacked when facing our fears. We have Jesus, the one who did what we cannot do. God's Word never departed from his mouth and he was careful to do everything written in it, without fail. We have Jesus, the one who lived in perfect obedience to God the Father but went to the cross for our disobedience. We have Jesus, the one in whom we live and have our being.
